The target audience for the SBCCP includes a wide range of organizations, agencies, and members of the public directly or indirectly impacted by or interested in the HCP/NCCP process.






Covered Activities

- The list of projects and activities for which take authorization will be provided by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and California Department of Fish and Wildlife for the species addressed in the SBCCP.
- To be eligible for incidental take authorization, activities must be otherwise lawful; not funded, authorized, or carried out by a federal agency; and must be under the direct control or authority of the permittee.

Typical Covered Activities:

- Housing development
- Commercial development
- New infrastructure development (roads, pipelines etc.)

Activities are based on the approved General Plan



Reminder:

The SBCCP does not

- Approve or deny specific projects
- Replace or change the County's permitting or planning process
- Add or reduce development permitting requirements



Process for Identifying Covered Activities

Step 1. Identify potential covered activities

- Includes both specific projects and on-going activities
- There is a reasonable expectation that the covered activity would occur within the permit term of the Plan
- Enough is known to adequately describe the activity and the effect it would have on covered species.

Process for Identifying Covered Activities

Step 2. Apply screening criteria

- Control or Authority
- Location
- Timing

- Impact
- Project Definition
- Practicability



Process for Identifying Covered Activities


Step 3. Draft, review, and finalize list and descriptions

- Iterative process
- Demands a high level of input and feedback from County staff and others familiar with the activities
- Must have enough information on all covered activities to perform the impact analysis




Urban Projects in Rural Areas

- Development that will typically result in nearly 100 percent loss of natural habitats with the exception of urban streams.
- Urban projects occur within the unincorporated County in areas around cities where infrastructure and public services are available.



General Rural Development

- Development outside the urban service area and established designated urban areas in unincorporated San Benito County.
- Residential development in areas outside the planning limits of urban growth but where infrastructure and public services are available.



Rural Infrastructure Development


- Public infrastructure projects outside the cities' planning limits of urban growth.
- Rural transportation projects provide and enhance infrastructure that supports existing development and new development planned under current general plans.

Rural Operations and Maintenance

- Operation is defined as activities which require continual use and management in order to work properly.
- Maintenance is defined as activities which are preventive, corrective, or scheduled in order to fix a project or keep it working effectively.



In-Stream Operations and Maintenance

- Activities or projects that occur in or immediately adjacent to streams and adjacent riparian vegetation that may result in impacts on a stream or canal.
- This may include activities at dams, reservoirs, and on-stream ponds.









Categories of Covered Activities

Conservation Strategy Implementation

Implementing some of the mitigation actions may result in low levels of take of the covered species that therefore require take authorization and must also be named as covered activities.

What About Agricultural Activities?

Normal and routine agricultural practices are not usually covered, with

some exceptions.




Yolo HCP/NCCP Example:

- Normal and routine agricultural practices on conservation easement lands in the reserve system
- Management activities to maintain suitable habitat conditions
- Activities associated with agricultural economic development



What About Agricultural Activities?



Santa Clara County HCP/NCCP Example:

Neighboring landowner protection program:

- Take coverage for routine ag activities on lands within 1 mile of Reserve System boundaries
- Limited to a subset of covered species
