BEHAVIORAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT - A. YAMAMOTO

Behavioral Health Director Alan Yamamoto thanked the Board for their support of this event. He also thanked all of the people in the planning process because it takes a lot of work. He provided information on the Red Ribbon Run which will take place October 19th at 8:00 a.m. at the Vet's Hall. He said that they will be doing a Fall Festival this year that will take place at Maze Middle School on November 2, 2019. He also thanked all of the Agencies involved and businesses in town that donate things and everyone who helps with these events.

Those speaking from the public were: Jerry Tatro, resident on Salinas Grade Road, spoke about how nothing has been done on the road and how it is highly used on a daily basis and it is a mess. He said that he would like to see something done on it. He spoke of the invoice that he gave the County for the tree that he removed and is currently in the culvert. He said that it is the Counties responsibility.

Natasha Wist spoke about the 3 minute buzzer rule and how it is hard to speak under the 3 minutes and how we should hold up a 30 second sign to warn them.

e. Department Head Announcements: Information Only

Clerk/Auditor/Recorder/Elections Joe Paul Gonzalez introduced a new recent member to the Elections Department Francisco Diaz. He said that Mr. Diaz was with the County prior for 5 years and left for 18 months and now he is returning to work in our Department again.

Mr. Diaz thanked Joe Paul and Angela Curro for letting him return. He said that he is glad to be back and thanked the Supervisors for granting his return.

Joe Paul introduced Sheyla Gonzalez who has been working with outreach efforts.

Ms. Gonzalez announced that today was National Voter Registration Day and they will be out at the Public Library on the lawn area from 1:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. to help people register. The upcoming election will be on March 3, 2020.

Assistant Clerk Recorder/Register of Voters Angela Curro spoke of how party matter in the 2020 March Primary Election. She provided a handout for the March 3, 2020 Primary Election and spoke of crossover. She said that they will be sending out information to the voters in regards to this.

CAO Ray Espinosa announced that he and Supervisor Jaime De La Cruz and Peter Hernandez will be attending the RCRC Conference this week and have a scheduled meeting to talk about SB1, Caltrans, Hwy 25 roundabout and expansion project.

Supervisor Jaime De La Cruz as part of the Ad Hoc committee thanked staff, CAO and Dulce Alonso for all her hard work on this. He provided background information. He said that Nash Road needs to be closed and this is the first step. He said that we need to construct parking lot along River Parkway for the High School and for a future sports complex.

Supervisor Peter Hernandez as part of the Ad Hoc committee provided information and spoke of the value and the benefit to our kids and the economic benefits that this brings is huge.

CAO Ray Espinosa said that this is the first step to the process. He said that there is also some concerns about weed abatement in that area that we are working on as well. He said that we currently have a traffic study going on right now and when we get the report back we will be coming back to the Board for some mitigation on that.

Public Comment:

Marty Richman, Hollister resident, said that he shares the goals of the Board wanting to put a sports complex out there. He said that his one concern is the traffic issue. He said that the closing of Nash Road is going to bring some hardship. He said that he is glad there is a study being done because they are very important. He said I think we are on the right track.

Steve Ward, Professional Empire for Baseball and lives next to the River Parkway road, asked the Board to consider trip ends at both ends of River Parkway. He spoke about the agreement that they signed saying that this was not going to happen until 2021. He asked the Board to slow this down and not rush it because there is a lot of us that are impacted. He spoke of how this impacts EMS because of getting in an out if there was an emergency.

Supervisor Anthony Botelho said I think Mr. Ward brought up a couple of good facts. He said that it is important that we are in compliance with that agreement. He said that he thinks we should have the assessment of the traffic study before we do the road closure. We can still build a parking lot and continue to work with the park.

County Counsel Barbara Thompson said that the Board is not taking any action today to close the road that will require a public hearing and will come back at a future date. This is for the parking lot.

Supervisor Jaime De La Cruz said that Nash Road will not close anytime soon. This is a process and the first step of the process is building a relationship and working with the City of Hollister and the High School to work on a parking lot. The second step is working on the traffic study to see what would happen if we close Nash Road and the impacts.

Supervisor Peter Hernandez mentioned that there was a meeting with the City, High School and County staff in regards to mitigation measures.

Chairman Mark Medina stated for the record; we are not voting to close Nash Road today that would be done at a later date after mitigation measures have been completed. He said we are working on the parking lot only.

It said that he encourages the Board to approve the Nodes and support the applicants and that the revenue from this could help in public safety, economic and workforce development, social services, infrastructure, roads, etc.

Natasha Wist, spoke about marching for climate justice.

James Starkewolf, Salinas resident and a member of Preserve our Rural Communities, said that he feels that the Board has already made up their mind. He said that the next step is to circulate a petition for the referendum to see what the people think.

Andy Hsia-Coron, Preserve our Rural Communities, spoke of how the nodes are cancerous, traffic has increased and the water situation has changed. Spoke of a economic report or study.

Mary Hsia-Coron, Aromas resident, read letter from a friend of hers Cara Vonk who heard on a newscast a report on the West Coast's most underrated cities and San Juan Bautista was ranked #2. She said I believe you are making a terrible mistake not capitalizing on our most valuable asset, the promotion of a still rural, agricultural, ranch, historical, wine and recreation County within striking distance of a major metropolitan areas. Ms. Coron said by creating a lot of shopping areas along the Hwy it could affect the shops in San Juan Bautista.

Richard Wist, spoke about public outreach and how we do not need this development.

Jackie Morris-Lopez, San Juan Bautista resident, spoke about the talk about all these wonderful jobs which is false, spoke of poor planning and over growth.

Mary Vazquez Edge, San Juan Bautista resident, said to take in to consideration San Juan Bautista. These nodes will affect the economy in San Juan Bautista.

Michael Ostrowsk, Preserve our Local Communities, said that he loves this area and has been a resident for 20 years. This is not what we need.

Zachary Walton, Law Firm for the Commercial Nodes, spoke of the concerns of developments, water, etc. He said that the Commercial Nodes were put in to the general plan by the Board and today is the zoning code consideration that was put in the general plan.

Jonathan Deikman, Royal Oaks, spoke about the Board making bad decision and how to stop them.

Chairman Medina closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Jim Gillio said that he met with the PORC group, met with landowners and walked out to the properties of the nodes and have studied the general plan use section 5.1. He said I believe there are a lot of protections for San Juan Bautista. He said that he supports this today and will scrutinize all of these projects to support San Juan Bautista.

Supervisor Anthony Botelho stated that this is in his district and that he has thought about this very deeply. 33. COUNTY ADMINISTRATION OFFICE - R. ESPINOSA

Discussion and approval of Second Amendment to landfill operating agreement with Waste Solutions Group of San Benito, LLC. SBC FILE NUMBER: 119

CAO Ray Espinosa introduced Michael Colantuono who is the person that is contracted with the County to assist with this contract.

Chairman Mark Medina provided additional information that this is a contract that has been going

on for roughly two years so there has been a lot of research and work that has been put in to it.

Mr. Colantuono said that he is a local government lawyer and took on this project last November. He said that he had three things to talk about: 1) the relationship with Waste Connections; 2) the broad deal points in front of them today and 3) the changes that have been made in the last 24 hours. He said that the County owns the John Smith Landfill and the County use to operate the John Smith Landfill and has contracted with Waste Connections, Inc. which is a large corporation to operate the Landfill. He provided background information on the agreement. He said that Waste Connections has found the need to expand the landfill. He said getting expansion requires a lot of lawyers and consultants. He said that they came to us and said that we need your cooperation in order to achieve the expansion permit. He said that we said that we have a deal for you, we will certainly help you with that expansion but there are changes we want to see in our relationship as well. He said that is how we came to the agreement that we have today.

He provided information on the major deal points of this agreement: Waste Connections will always maintain 15 years capacity in the landfill promise; they are going to do the work to get the permitting for the landfill; engage in our community in regards to recycling issues; they are going to continue to cooperate with us in regards to compliance with the State laws to reduce the amount of waste that goes to the landfill; there is an existing provision in the agreement that gives them a cost of living adjustment on the compensation that they receive but will be temporary suspending that while we are in the process of working on the permits; spoke about the boiler plate of the agreement. He said that this is a much stronger contract than what it was. Page 29 of the agreement is the economic promise, landfill depletion fee; Page 30 there is a payment to the County \$200,000 per year until they give up on their expansion, achieve permits that is to improve the landfill roads; paragraph 5 the rate the locals pay is higher than the rate that is charged to the contracted individuals that bring in from the outside. He said that we got a reduction of tipping fees and a cap on future increase of fees; paragraph 6 Waste Connections is going to purchase the landfill, we will end up owning that land; paragraph 7 provides for an immediate increase in the tipping fee revenue to the County of a \$1.00 a ton for up to three years; paragraph 8 is a temporary increase in the depletion fee; paragraph 9, they are not happy with the intersection of John Smith Road and Fairview Road because they can only bring their trucks in from one direction the contractor shall pay County \$2,000,000 to fund the realignment project; paragraph 10 pertains to the environmental review which the County is responsible to do, Waste Connections is going to hire a consultant to write the report. He said what the EIR most likely will do is change the economics of the expansion, so we will probably be sitting down with Waste Connections in six months to do the 3rd Amendment to the contract which is not a bad thing it will give us another opportunity to maintain the relationship for the community; paragraph 11 on page 33 continue negotiations in regards to the haul route.

He went over the changes that have taken place in the last 24 hours. He said after the red line yesterday there was one more language change on page 30, we are getting lower tipping fees for our residents to 10%.

Discussion ensued by Board and Mr. Colantuono.

Supervisor Botelho thanked Mr. Colantuono for his thurl work on this contract and thanked Waste Connections. He said that this is a great agreement going forward for the County.

Supervisor Gillio thanked everyone for their efforts and time on this and Waste Connections for their negotiations.

Public Comment:

Marty Richman, Hollister resident, said he thinks you caught the boat on this one. I am glad to see

a contract that recognizes the value of that landfill. He said the value of our landfill have gone up like the transportation has gone up.

Natashia Wist, San Juan resident, asked how much trash are we taking from other Counties in to our Landfill. She said that she is surprised to hear that the Board has approved this corporation to pay for the Environmental Impact Report and choose the company that is going to do it. I feel we should get a neutral organization to do it. She said that methane gas is about 80% worse that Co2 in causing global warning, it is highly toxic. So she was wondering what could be done about this. She said that she is also concerned about our County being a dumping ground for bigger Counties to get rid of their trash.

Chairman Mark Medina provided information to some of her questions.

Maria Hsia Coron, Aromas resident, spoke about climate change and Methane gas issue.
